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1 (MONTHLY BOARD MEETING COMMENCED AT 11:25 A.M.)

2 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Well, first of all, for  
3 those of us who are here, thank you very much for  
4 attending. I'm awfully sorry, and I apologize. It  
5 appears as though we're not going to have a quorum today  
6 to transact business, so I apologize for getting you  
7 here. We were hoping that ultimately, we would have a  
8 quorum today, and conceivably, we still may; but it's  
9 doubtful.

10 However, while we are here, we can't take any  
11 official actions with regard to Items for Action today  
12 or approval of the previous minutes, but we do have some  
13 things to discuss with those of you that are here. One  
14 of the things we'd like to do is, do you want to do the  
15 report?

16 RAYMOND MARSHALL: Sure. I can do my  
17 report, but the other item I think you want to do is...

18 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: One of the things we'd  
19 like to do today is, for those of us that were here  
20 earlier, we took a tour through the new Operations

21 building, and we thought it would be appropriate this  
22 morning to have our Commissioners take a look at how the  
23 new lab building's progressing.  
24 So, we have some representatives from Camp Dresser  
25 McKee who have been retained by the Commission to

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1 provide design services.

2 Pat Hughes and Bob Otoski and Nick Safina are here.

3 Is Nick going to do the presentation? Nick's going to

4 do the presentation. So, Terry are we geared up?

5 MS. COTE: We are.

6 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: We're ready to go? Do

7 you want to drop the screen?

8 MS. COTE: I want to drop the screen.

9 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Where do you want Nick

10 to present from, Terry?

11 MS. COTE: Wherever you think his boards, he

12 has some boards of the presentation as well.

13 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Where do you want to

14 put them up, back here (indicating)?

15 MS. COTE: Yes.

16 RAYMOND MARSHALL: While they're setting up

17 for that, I'll just give you a very brief report. We're

18 working on the calendar for Commissioner meetings for

19 2012, so you'll be hearing from us. We might do a  
20 little poll to make sure we're holding meetings at the  
21 most convenient time for the greatest number of people.  
22 Operations wise, everything's going well. The  
23 treatment plants are running very well, and effluent is  
24 good. Across the street, the contractor's doing a  
25 wonderful job. Daniel O'Connell & Sons is making great

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1 progress, working very well with the Operations staff,  
2 and that's extremely important because we still need to  
3 meet our permit.  
4 Generally, we are putting a lot of projects out to  
5 bid, mostly on Phase II for the CSO, so we'll be  
6 awarding those, a couple in December. You already have  
7 awarded a couple, and then we have the Bucklin Point  
8 job, which we'll now rollover, upgrade. We'll roll that  
9 over to December also.  
10 So, overall, things are going very well. We just had  
11 our lien sale last week, and we collected \$624,000 from  
12 that lien sale effort. We started out with 300 accounts  
13 to collect from, and we ended up with only 4 or 5 that  
14 weren't resolved. So, that was a great effort by Legal.  
15 As soon as everyone has their handouts, I'll turn it  
16 over to Nick, just in the meantime. I think you'll find

17 this interesting.

18 As the Chairman said, we'll be doing a lot of work on  
19 this, and we think we have something for you that you'll  
20 be very pleased with. So, Nick, are you ready to go, or  
21 do you need a couple more minutes?

22 MR. SAFINA: No, I'm fine.

23 RAYMOND MARSHALL: Okay.

24 MR. SAFINA: Well, thank you for having us  
25 this morning. My name is Nick Safina. I'm an architect

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1 with CDM. I'm just here to present a quick update on  
2 the status of the Regulatory Compliance Building and  
3 Lab.

4 Since you last saw this, perhaps, almost several  
5 years ago, the building has rotated, and we've defined  
6 the layouts for the lab staff; and I think we have an  
7 approval on the basic layouts that we're providing.

8 What you see here on the pulldown is a view looking  
9 towards the building to the south. The COB is to the  
10 right side, and the operations are on the left.

11 Previously, the building was rotated 90 degrees, but we  
12 found that this layout worked better for separating some  
13 of the traffic movements with passenger vehicles which  
14 will stay up at Service Road levels, and deliveries will

15 happen down on back on the plant side.  
16 This view here is from the south main entrance, the  
17 main public entrance to the building. Access from the  
18 parking lot, which occurs here, now, this is from the  
19 south side looking towards the north, the new Operations  
20 building that you were touring in the background there,  
21 the parking lot is up here on Service Road, separated  
22 the delivery and heavy truck traffic from passenger  
23 vehicles and pedestrians.  
24 There's a quick site layout that shows you that the  
25 building which will have some personnel access so that

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1 staff can come into the building quickly from the COB  
2 side or from the plant side, but all of the public  
3 access will happen from this main entrance down on the  
4 parking lot side.  
5 We did provide a loading dock down at plant level and  
6 several parking spaces down there, and there are 46  
7 spaces up top with a quick dropoff area. We were able  
8 to reconfigure that retaining wall that's back there,  
9 and we addressed some concerns by staff.  
10 We provided a bigger buffer from the edge of the wall  
11 to the parking lot that will allow for better plowing  
12 and for security issues which we'll have to address with

13 the fenceline on that back side. So, the plant is  
14 secure at the bottom side, and the public side is open  
15 to Service Road.  
16 Just some quick plans here, all of the blue spaces  
17 are laboratory spaces. The yellow is circulation, the  
18 gray are office, and the rest are support spaces. First  
19 floor is a small basement level which allows us to load  
20 from the plant side. All the samples and materials  
21 deliveries will come in through there.  
22 This is the main public entrance here. The staff  
23 will have access from the side as well as the back, and  
24 it's laid out according to what the lab staff needed is  
25 to operate the lab and to maintain custody of samples

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1 and quality control.  
2 The second floor is probably half laboratory, that's  
3 the brown and blue, and then this dark gray is all of  
4 the office support spaces and conference rooms and break  
5 rooms, restrooms, and there's an additional penthouse  
6 story above this where all the mechanical equipment, the  
7 major mechanical equipment will feed down to the  
8 laboratories. That can be seen there. That's the  
9 penthouse up top there.  
10 A couple of things that happened with this new

11 arrangement, it helps us to screen some of those stacks  
12 and utilities that come in off the roof, so from this  
13 side, the angle of the roof helps to hide those but  
14 keeps them accessible, so we can maintain the equipment.

15 We're thinking right now that we're about two months  
16 away from 30 percent submittal, whether that happens  
17 before the end of the year or after the beginning of the  
18 year, but it's right around there; so it's two months to  
19 30 percent. We'll get some comments and incorporate  
20 those and then proceed.

21 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Nick, if you don't mind  
22 going back to the circulation, the floor plan. I'd like  
23 you to speak a little bit to the Commissioners about our  
24 decision for the transparency in conjunction with our  
25 educational program, how that's going to work with the

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1 transparency in the labs as for purposes of classes and  
2 viewing. Would you mind talking about that a little  
3 bit?

4 MR. SAFINA: Sure. This yellow corridor  
5 that you see here allows you to take tours for  
6 education, for public information, down through the  
7 laboratory spaces, but not be inside the laboratory, so  
8 the laboratory walls will have a lot of glass on those

9 sides. You can take people down here. It's safe, it's  
10 secure. You can see into the laboratories and not  
11 disrupt lab operations. That was an element that we  
12 added. It's also happening on the second floor as well.  
13 The same conditions.

14 So, the laboratories have a lot of the glass on these  
15 interior walls here. You can see into the spaces.  
16 Again, that helps with keeping the tour separated, but  
17 in other laboratories what we've done is, it helps with  
18 safety; and people can see each other as their working  
19 in the labs, and managers can walk down to see what's  
20 going on. A quick sight in and out of the labs.

21 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Our presentation rooms,  
22 we have some presentation areas, right?

23 MR. SAFINA: Yes. We have two large  
24 conference rooms on the top floor, and we also have a  
25 large break room which can be used for training and

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1 meetings.

2 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Any of our  
3 Commissioners have any questions with regard to the 30  
4 percent design? Commissioner Campbell.

5 COMMISSIONER CAMPBELL: The building that we  
6 were just in had all of these green features. Is this

7 building designed similarly?

8 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Where are we in terms  
9 of that, Nick? We have a lot of green areas, I know. I  
10 mean, are you talking about the energy efficiencies and  
11 all of that?

12 COMMISSIONER CAMPBELL: Yes, right.

13 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Nick, why don't you  
14 talk about that.

15 MR. SAFINA: Sure. We're doing a lot of  
16 sustainable design features. I don't think there's been  
17 a definitive decision on whether to pursue LEEDS yet,  
18 but we've got a lot of daylighting into the labs, a lot  
19 of views in and out of the spaces.

20 The systems will be energy efficient and highly  
21 controllable, especially with the laboratory  
22 environment. They have specific requirements on their  
23 heat and humidity controls.

24 We've got a lot of green space that we've tried to  
25 incorporate into some of these paved areas. The trees

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1 will help with shading, and the grass will help with

2 reducing impervious surface.

3 If you look at this, we're even starting to consider

4 how we collect stormwater in potentially a basin in this

5 lower corner here, the clarifiers are out over there, so  
6 we so we can potentially collect all of this stormwater  
7 and put it into there.

8 Because of the elevation change, we're considering to  
9 potentially have a cistern that collects this stormwater  
10 and reuse that for maybe the irrigation system, if we  
11 have plans that require that.

12 So, right now we're considering a lot of easy  
13 sustainable features. We've got solar shading on the  
14 windows.

15 COMMISSIONER WORRELL: Is the parking lot  
16 permeable?

17 MR. SAFINA: We haven't decided what that  
18 can be yet. We'll have to talk to the maintenance staff  
19 and see what they would like. A lot of times what we do  
20 is we make the parking spaces permeable concrete and  
21 then make the driving areas regular asphalt. That's a  
22 little better with maintenance and plowing, but that's  
23 something we can consider.

24 COMMISSIONER WORRELL: Well, for an  
25 organization that is constantly trying to preach that

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1 kind of construction, it seems to me we ought to be  
2 practicing it as well. That's Question Number 1.

3 Question Number 2, do you have any sense, and I'm  
4 looking for just a broad answer, what it would cost,  
5 Commissioner Nathan and I were talking about this  
6 earlier, what it would cost to go from traditional  
7 construction methodology to LEES construction  
8 methodology, perhaps as a percentage of overall cost of  
9 the project?

10 MR. SAFINA: For a laboratory building, it  
11 gets complex, and so to get to maybe a LEEDS silver,  
12 it's probably going to be somewhere between 6 and 8  
13 percent more construction costs and then another  
14 \$150,000 to commission it. There's a party  
15 commissioning for all of those systems. Laboratories  
16 need a lot of air, a lot of energy, and so it becomes  
17 complex. You have to start adding features to collect  
18 points.

19 COMMISSIONER NATHAN: So, you may not want  
20 to do that.

21 MR. SAFINA: Right. So, what we could do is  
22 design it so that it LEEDS certifiable, and then make a  
23 decision at some point whether to pursue the actual  
24 certificate. There are other rating systems out there  
25 as well. There's Green Globe.

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1 There's a new system coming out specifically for  
2 wastewater utilities which have different requirements,  
3 so that's something that we'll look at in this next  
4 piece and present information to you so you can make a  
5 decision.

6 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Any other questions  
7 from anyone?

8 THE COMMISSION: (No response)

9 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Nick, can you go back  
10 to the first slide, please? I'm extremely excited about  
11 this building because we spent a lot of time with staff  
12 and Terry and everybody involved in this project,  
13 especially on the interior and circulation piece about  
14 the transparency with our labs because we're going to  
15 have a lot of interest in this laboratory, a lot of high  
16 school and elementary school people coming through who  
17 will be able to get a firsthand glimpse into our  
18 operations in a very safe environment, so I'm really  
19 excited about that aspect of it; but on this particular  
20 slide, you'll probably notice that the one thing that's  
21 missing here are the high tension wires.

22 So, I want you to know that Tom Uva's leading the  
23 charge here for us. We have been in contact with  
24 National Grid from last year talking a little bit about  
25 the possibility of 1, doing some underground utilities,

1 or 2, moving the utility lines to behind this building  
2 along --

3 RAYMOND MARSHALL: Shipyard Drive.

4 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Shipyard Drive. So, in  
5 any event, it is our intention to clean up the street so  
6 that we can have unobstructed views of our new building.

7 So, hopefully, at some point it will look exactly like  
8 that, and I'm ecstatic about the way things are coming;  
9 and I'm so excited about what's happening here in  
10 Field's Point at the Bay Commission. Anything else that  
11 anybody wants to talk about in regard to the building?

12 THE COMMISSION: (No response)

13 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: 30 percent in about two  
14 months, 30 percent design, and then we'll give the Board  
15 another presentation. Terry, anything you want to add.  
16 Where are you? There you are.

17 MS. COTE: No. I think he did a very good  
18 job explaining all of the things that we talked about  
19 with the building, and it is a beautiful building.

20 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: A lot of thought went  
21 into this, all the lab people, the Operations people  
22 thinking about plowing and all the maintenance issues  
23 involved in this building, so I'm thrilled with the way  
24 it's coming along. Hopefully, what are we thinking  
25 about next, put a shovel in the ground?

1 MS. COTE: At least another eight months or  
2 so to design.

3 MR. SAFINA: Eight months for design, three  
4 months to bid it.

5 RAYMOND MARSHALL: Maybe next fall we'll  
6 probably have an item before you to actually award the  
7 construction contract for this project.

8 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Next fall another photo  
9 op, all right. Okay, is that it? Any other questions  
10 for Nick? Commissioner Campbell.

11 COMMISSIONER CAMPBELL: I just said to Ray,  
12 within the last couple of weeks I had a presentation at  
13 URI of the new chemistry building, and most of the  
14 laboratories are behind glass; so there's a central  
15 corridor, and then I think there's some desks, and then  
16 the laboratories are behind glass.

17 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: They must have came  
18 into one of our meetings.

19 COMMISSIONER CAMPBELL: I don't know who the  
20 architect was down there.

21 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: All right. Anything  
22 else?

23 THE COMMISSION: (No response)

24 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: All right. Thank you,  
25 Nick, thank you Pat and Bob.

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1 RAYMOND MARSHALL: I have one other thing I  
2 want to mention. One of the things I want to mention to  
3 the Commissioners is, as you drive out here, when you  
4 drive past the tunnel pump station, you look off to your  
5 right, that big area that we have over this now, a large  
6 amount of material is stored there. Those are the tops  
7 of the wind turbines, so the generators are in, the hubs  
8 are in, the housings are in; and they're all stored  
9 there on site. We're waiting now for the blades to come  
10 in and for the towers.  
11 They're putting in the foundations now, and then  
12 they'll start erecting the actual visual portion of the  
13 wind turbines, probably sometime in the early spring.  
14 Yes.

15 COMMISSIONER CAMPBELL: How do they get the  
16 top of the turbine up to the top of the tower?

17 RAYMOND MARSHALL: With a very large crane.  
18 It's one of most expensive parts of the entire job.  
19 They'll have everything ready. They'll have a gigantic  
20 crane come down here, and they'll do each of the three.  
21 I'm not sure how many days it takes to erect a single

22 wind turbine, but that will be interesting. We can let  
23 you know ahead of time when that's going to occur, so if  
24 it's not on a Board Meeting time period, you might want  
25 to come down and watch. In fact, the best place to

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1 watch might be from my office. You'll get a nice view  
2 over the top of everything.

3 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: I guess one other thing  
4 we can talk about just for a moment today is maybe a  
5 little about our computers and our technology. I  
6 assume that many of the computers that have been issued  
7 to the Commissioners have been left behind for your use  
8 when you get here or some of you take them home, but  
9 these are leased computers, laptops; so we thought we'd  
10 have a change of technology. So, we're going to be  
11 returning the computers. We're going to be collecting  
12 them from the Commissioners. We're going to have a new  
13 issue out, but the new issue is going to be a little  
14 more compact. So, are we going to get a presentation?

15 RAYMOND MARSHALL: Yes. Dan Smith, I  
16 believe is here, and he's going to let you know what it  
17 is, what technology we're bringing in. Dan, do you want  
18 to come up, please?

19 MR. SMITH: The future is here. Four years

20 ago at the request of the Chairman, IT went out and  
21 procured laptops, pretty much state of the art at the  
22 time. I think they've served everyone well, but that's  
23 four years ago.

24 Today we are going to present to you, I wish we were  
25 going to present to you, the new interface and the new

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1 approach to the Board meetings, and that is an iPad; and  
2 as I said, the new interface, which I probably should  
3 pass around at this point.

4 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Sure, by all means.

5 RAYMOND MARSHALL: They are actually much  
6 easier to use than the laptop. My wife has one. She  
7 never lets me touch it, but it's amazing what they can  
8 do. Costwise, Dan?

9 MR. SMITH: It's about 1/3 of the cost of a  
10 laptop, so it's considerably less expensive, power is  
11 equivalent, if not greater than the laptop and certainly  
12 more compact.

13 (COMMISSIONER DiCHIRO IS NOW PRESENT)

14 RAYMOND MARSHALL: Training, how are you  
15 going to roll these out to the Commissioners?

16 MR. SMITH: Well, we're very confident that  
17 the majority of the Commissioners should have no issue

18 utilizing this new tool. For the few that have a little  
19 bit of an issue, we will be providing a good cheatsheet  
20 and some handholding through the initial process.

21 COMMISSIONER THOMPSON: Will these also be  
22 leased?

23 MR. SMITH: Yes.

24 COMMISSIONER THOMPSON: For how long?

25 MR. SMITH: Three years. We actually

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1 extended the laptops for a year, but we will not be  
2 disposing of the laptops. We will be moving them over  
3 into the new Operations building for training and such,  
4 and probably in the three year hence, we'll look at  
5 doing the same thing with the iPads.

6 RAYMOND MARSHALL: So, this is actually a  
7 much easier unit to use overall. Everything's, you  
8 touch with your finger, you swipe it, very intuitive,  
9 and you'll be able to see the same information that as  
10 you get now on your laptop in a more compact form.  
11 We'll probably get some stands so we can stand them up  
12 in front of you, and you'll get all the information that  
13 you get now on a much more compact and economical unit.

14 COMMISSIONER THOMPSON: Are they wireless?

15 MR. SMITH: Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER THOMPSON: When you're out of a  
17 wireless zone, can you still connect?

18 MR. SMITH: No. We chose not to do that  
19 because it's a considerable additional cost.

20 RAYMOND MARSHALL: So, if you're in a WiFi  
21 area like this building, you'd be out on the Internet.  
22 If you're in an airport, depending on the airport you  
23 can get out on the Internet.

24 Like O'Hare, when my wife and I travel, she couldn't  
25 get on the O'Hare WiFi system. It was just so jammed

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1 up. Down at Green, there's no problems.

2 COMMISSIONER THOMPSON: Generally, wherever  
3 there's WiFi.

4 MR. SMITH: That's correct. It comes either  
5 with or without.

6 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: I'm just going to ask,  
7 when are they going to collect these, and when will  
8 these be available?

9 MR. SMITH: The next Board Meeting.

10 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: The next Board Meeting.

11 MR. SMITH: Just in time for Christmas.

12 COMMISSIONER NATHAN: Can we take these  
13 home?

14 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: You can take it home.

15 RAYMOND MARSHALL: Yes. We have a system  
16 where everyone gets assigned one, and then if you want  
17 to take it home, Commissioners, you fill out the sheets.  
18 We know where to find you.

19 COMMISSIONER LEONE: Commissioner  
20 Montanari's going to be giving classes on Wednesdays at  
21 his home.

22 COMMISSIONER MONTANARI: I think it's time  
23 for me to resign.

24 RAYMOND MARSHALL: Al, this is getting  
25 easier.

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1 COMMISSIONER MONTANARI: It's pretty  
2 complicated to me.

3 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: So, this is great. I  
4 think it's great, and it's a lot more compact. I don't  
5 know if you've heard what Ray said, you'll be able to,  
6 there's a form to sign so we know you have possession of  
7 it, and you can take it with you, and you'll have it.

8 RAYMOND MARSHALL: The training staff is  
9 available. If you're not sure on how to use it, and you  
10 want to take it home and work with it for a while and  
11 then you need, like, 15, 20 minutes, a 1/2 an hour of

12 additional coaching, call up, and IT will agree to meet  
13 with you first thing in the morning, noontime, late  
14 afternoon, whatever works for you so that you can become  
15 comfortable with the technology. It's really a lot  
16 easier than using a laptop. It really is. So, we think  
17 that you'll really like it.

18 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Other than that,  
19 there's not much else we can do today, right?

20 RAYMOND MARSHALL: Correct.

21 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: So, I don't even think  
22 that we convened. Did we convene?

23 MR. DeANGELIS: No.

24 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: We didn't even convene,  
25 did we?

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1 MR. DeANGELIS: No.

2 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: We didn't call the  
3 meeting to order. So, again, I want to apologize for  
4 getting you here today and not being able to transact  
5 business, I appreciate it, but it was worth coming. We  
6 got a tour of the building, we got a little update on  
7 the new building, you got a small tutorial on the iPad,  
8 and so it was worthwhile, I think.

9 The other thing is, of course, you get some great

10 sandwiches. I notice that nobody's eating, so why don't  
11 we have a little lunch. What we're going to do is kick  
12 over all of today's business over to the December  
13 meeting.

14 RAYMOND MARSHALL: That is December 14th.  
15 It will be a busy day because we'll have several more  
16 items to add to what we already had on the agenda for  
17 today.

18 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Is that it?

19 RAYMOND MARSHALL: That's it.

20 CHAIRMAN MESOLELLA: Thank you, all. Thank  
21 you very much.
