RESOLUTIONS:

- An Act Relating to Taxation-Levy and Assessment of Local Taxes, Opposing H-5044, H-5173 and S-559: Discussion ensued regarding loss of revenue to the Town; once a developer completes the building of a home he/she would be exempt from taxes for at least two years. Mr. DeAngelis stated that if a regular citizen were to build they would not be able to take advantage of this exemption. Mrs. Speakman stated that Representatives Hearn and Malik have voted in favor of this bill because it helps to stimulate the construction business. Town Solicitor Michael Ursillo stated that the House has passed H-5044 but that the vote has not taken place in the Senate. Mr. Carroll amended the resolution to read within the section of "NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Council of the Town of Barrington respectfully requests the Rhode Island General Assembly to stop any attempts to introduce similar legislation; and oppose passage of such legislation and we ask that the Governor veto any such bills; . . ." Mr. Carroll amended the section to read, "BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That a copy of this resolution is forwarded to the Governor of Rhode Island, . . ." Mrs. Strong requested that the word ~~custom~~ be removed within the third paragraph. **Motion** by Mrs. Strong and seconded by Mrs. Weymouth to oppose passage of such legislation and we ask that the Governor veto any such bills. **The motion passed unanimously.** Mrs. Speakman requested that the bill be sent to our Governor, State Senator and Representatives.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no public comment.

BRISTOL COUNTY WATER AUTHORITY:

Director Alan Klepper was present to answer questions regarding the monthly report from the Bristol County Water Authority. Mrs. Strong asked Mr. Klepper if the underground piping is in bad shape. Discussion ensued regarding updating the piping throughout Barrington.

DISCUSS AND ACT ON REQUEST FOR FUNDING A SYNTHETIC TURF FIELD AT THE BARRINGTON HIGH SCHOOL:

Alex Robertson, 9 Elm Lane, explained to the members of the Town Council that he had presented his request to fund a synthetic turf field to members of the School Committee. He said that the School Committee voted 3-1 not to endorse the concept. Mrs. Weymouth asked Mr. Robertson if he had met with the Finance Director for the Town and discussed the effect of the bond regarding debt service and bond ratings. Kevin Ryan, 21 Harrison Avenue, stated that he spoke with the Finance Director and discussed financing a bond for \$1,500,000.00. He said that it would raise the tax rate to .07 for 10 years. Discussion ensued with past projects that involved school fields and other athletic projects which only involved the vote of the municipal government but did not have the involvement, or a vote, from the school committee/administration. Mr. Ryan stated that in years past there were several requests for additional fields, as well as, a request for a turf field. But to no avail other projects took precedent. Although, Mr. Ryan said, that when Melissa Horne was the Chair of Parks and Recreation she explained that the fields were in bad shape and that there was not enough field space for the teams. He said that in the last ten (10) years that the only additional field which was built is located on Sowams Road and was purchased with Town funds. He said that the clearing and seeding of that field was privately handled. Mr. Ryan said this is the time to invest in a turf field. He said that this season it cost \$2,100.00 to rent turf fields for our teams for practice and play due to the poor conditions of our natural fields this season. Mr. Ryan read from the 2015 Comprehensive Plan Section 6: Outdoor Recreation – Goals, Objectives, Policies and Actions: Goal OR-1: Meet the community's evolving recreation needs, both passive and active, by providing high quality multiple-use outdoor recreation facilities benefiting people of all ages. Policy OR – 1.1.1: Emphasize improving existing facilities over acquisition of new properties in order to fully realize the potential of the Town's assets and limit conversion of natural areas into active recreational facilities. Mr. Ryan stated that one of the Actions stated within the Comprehensive Plan reads as follows: D. Pursue the installation of synthetic turf at Victory Field, subject to an evaluation of the costs and benefits compared to natural turf. Mr. Ryan stated that during Mrs. Speakman's campaign for election and re-election to office, she stated that she wanted to improve recreational areas and open spaces. Mr. Ryan stated that if the request of a turf field was granted the high school, and, the whole community would benefit. He said that the turf field could also have the potential of a source of revenue. Mr. Ryan said that at this time, a private group is ready, organized and energized to raise 40% of the funds for this project and requests that the Town Council place this on the agenda at the Financial Town Meeting (FTM) and let the voters decide.

Cyndee Fuller, 48 Townsend Street, stated that she submitted a letter dated March 30, 2015 to the Athletic Director, Town Manager and Council President not as the Chair of the Conservation Commission but as a private citizen and taxpayer. Mrs. Fuller asks that all who are involved with the possible funding of a turf field should weigh the pros and cons of installing an artificial turf field and look carefully at the current science on the chemical exposure and possible health effects associated with artificial turf fields. Mrs. Fuller stated that she is not in favor of the Town Council funding this project or placing it on the agenda of the FTM. Mrs. Fuller said that if it is sent to the FTM that the taxpayers should be made aware of the costs involved with the artificial turf field (construction, maintenance, capital costs and replacement costs).

Peter Ramsden, 153 Rumstick Road, stated that he is member of the committee to fund the artificial turf field. Mr. Ramsden stated that now is the time to fund this project because the interest rates are low and that it would have the least financial impact to our taxpayers. Mr. Ramsden stated that the natural fields have geese feces and if an artificial field is constructed, the geese will not indulge in consuming grass. Therefore, there will not be any geese feces.

Joel Hellmann, 13 Richmond Avenue, stated that he is opposed to the funding of a turf field, even though the \$1,500,000.00 will not affect our debt rating at this moment. But if we construct a new middle school, the possibility of that bond along with additional bonds, could affect our rating. Mr. Hellmann stated that the interest rate on \$1,500,000.00 is low but the fees to generate the bond may be high. Mr. Hellmann also stated that he is opposed to placing this on the FTM agenda.

Karen Flint, 6 Melrose Avenue, stated that she is a member of the committee to fund an artificial turf field. Mrs. Flint said that members of this committee will never have a child that will benefit from the construction of the turf field. She said all we are trying to do is to try and build a better community with better facilities. John Diel stated that many other communities have artificial turf fields. He stated that he is in favor of placing this on the FTM agenda to let the voters decide.

Geoff Grove, 16 Robbins Drive, stated that his view is that of a private citizen and not as a member of the Appropriations Committee. Mr. Grove distributed a letter to the members of the Town Council. Mr. Grove stated that he is in favor of improving the Town through thoughtful investments that enhance the livability and property values of our residents. These investments should be carefully planned so as to prioritize the projects that have the greatest impact to the most residents while being mindful of the taxpayers. Mr. Grove said that normally, a project of this scope is vetted through public discussion and Town deliberation and that many questions must be examined. Mr. Grove stated that this project should be examined and debated by the Town Council, with input from the Planning Board, School Committee and Appropriations Committee. Doing so allows our elected officials time and show the public that we are making a thoughtful investment with public dollars. Mr. Grove suggested that we begin deliberations of this project immediately and not debate this subject at the FTM when there may not be enough time to do justice to the topic.

Mrs. Speakman stated that Mr. Ryan was correct when saying that she got into this job because she was appalled with the state of our fields at that time. Mrs. Speakman stated that she is proud of the work that was done. Mrs. Speakman said that a lot of work was done with a small amount of money. Mrs. Speakman said there may have not been many new projects, but, many enhancements were done to our fields. Mr. Carroll stated that he appreciates all the hard work of this committee. Mr. Carroll said that at the beginning, members of the committee stated that the project would be fully funded through private donations. Mr. Carroll said that when the project changed, and the Town was asked to fund a portion of the project; the Town leaders had a responsibility to fully investigate and examine the project. Mr. Carroll said that it doesn't express opposition; it just means that we must go through the correct process. Mr. Primiano said that this Committee has made a compelling case but is concerned with the overall financial impact and should be fully investigated, examined and vetted. Mr. Primiano agreed with Mr. Carroll that the Town leaders have a responsibility to look at all the needs of the Town and to look at the priorities. Mr. Primiano suggested that we should consider looking further into this project through additional meetings with additional committees. Discussion ensued regarding which groups should be involved.

Laura Ramsden, 153 Rumstick Road, stated that she is not a member of the Committee. Mrs. Ramsden requested that the members of the Town Council develop procedures so that your average citizens, who have spent a lot of time and energy developing a plan or project to better the community, be given the right path of procedures so that projects can be vetted.

Tom Rimoshytus, 1 Howard Street, questioned why the School Committee and Administration needs to be involved. Mrs. Speakman said that the school controls the property. Discussion ensued regarding which committees and members from the Town should be involved with the formation of an ad hoc committee to discuss the proposal and future of this project. Mr. Primiano stated that he would support forming a committee to explore the proposal to fund an artificial turf field.

Motion by Mr. Primiano and seconded by Mr. Carroll to create an Ad Hoc Committee on the Artificial Turf Field composed of the following boards and commissions: Representatives from the Town Council (June Speakman and Steve Primiano volunteered to serve), School Committee, Conservation Commission, Park & Recreation Committee, Committee on Appropriations, Committee to Renovate Victory Field, Athletic Director, Director of Public Works, the Planning Board and Director of each Sports League. The Ad Hoc Committee will send their recommendations to the Town Council and School Committee by October 5, 2015. Mrs. Strong said that she cannot support this motion if the group does not examine the health and safety of artificial turf. Discussion ensued regarding exposure to the materials that are included in an artificial turf. Mrs. Weymouth stated that she has tried to remain unbiased but she stated that she had lead the plastic bag ban and is opposed to putting plastic into our environment. **The motion passed three in favor, Mrs. Speakman, Mr. Primiano and Mr. Carroll and two opposed, Mrs. Weymouth and Mrs. Strong.** The first meeting of the Ad Hoc Committee on the Artificial Turf Field will be held on Wednesday, April 29, 2015 at 7:00 P.M. in the Senior Center.

Mrs. Speakman recessed at 9:12 P.M.

Mrs. Speakman reconvened at 9:18 P.M.

DISCUSS AND ACT ON OPTING OUT OF RHODEMAP RI:

Mr. Primiano stated that he asked for this subject matter to be placed on the agenda because he has heard that a number of communities have submitted legislation to opt out of RhodeMap RI. Mr. Primiano said that there are a lot of good things in our Comprehensive Plan but he questioned whether there is a larger connection with AFFH (Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing) and many have stated that this is a concern. Mr. Primiano said if we do not address the concerns with AFFH and RhodeMap RI that it may put us at a risk and that it could have adverse effects. Mr. Primiano stated that he has tried to think of what the upside to participating in RhodeMap RI and he really can't think of one. Mr. Primiano said that although the speaker of the house has placed RhodeMap RI on the shelf, it could lead us down the road with HUD (US Department of Housing and Urban Development) mandates in RhodeMap RI since HUD helped fund the development of the plan. He said that there are a lot of unknowns that will affect our zoning, our tax rate and our property tax. Therefore, he is asking members of the Town Council that the Town of Barrington be included in legislation to opt out of RhodeMap RI. ~~or, for the legislature to rescind their vote on RhodeMap RI.~~ Mr. Primiano stated that we have been elected to serve and represent the interests of the citizens of Barrington.

Mr. Ursillo stated that some communities have supported legislation to opt out. Discussion ensued regarding a comparison of the last economic plan and RhodeMap RI; diversity of housing; mandates and enforcements from AFFH and HUD as well as requirements with funding. Mr. Primiano stated that he does not understand the requirements of AFFH, HUD with RhodeMap RI and is very wary. Discussion ensued regarding how RhodeMap RI is defined – is it a statute, regulation, judicial decision, statewide guideline, a framework to statewide planning; and the requirements by accepting grants, and, if the Town would be placed in risk of any violations. Town Planner Phil Hervey stated that the State's review of the Town's 2015 Comprehensive Plan, approved by the Council on March 25, will include a check for consistency with the new economic development plan that resulted from the RhodeMap RI process. The Office of Statewide Planning has informed him that the State's review is unlikely to require any changes to the Town's Economic Development element, such that RhodeMap RI will have no impact on the local plan. Mr. Hervey said that the Town is not subject to any new housing guidelines from RhodeMap RI since the housing plan, which is still in draft form, had not been adopted at the time the Town's Comprehensive Plan was approved by the Council.

Ed McKinley, 336 New Meadow Road, stated that he is concerned and requested that the Town Council reconsider any proposals regarding RhodeMap RI.

Discussion ensued regarding analysis of impediments and the specifics within RhodeMap RI.

Gary Morse, 2 Westwood Lane, stated that he is concerned with the potential loss of Town control and the adherence to RhodeMap RI.

Mr. Primiano reiterated that his concern is not with the information which is included in RhodeMap RI but what is not included in RhodeMap RI and the ramifications of accepting it. Mr. Primiano suggested that the Planning Board be given the task to investigate the issues of RhodeMap RI and report back to Town Council. Discussion ensued. Mr. Ursillo stated that information regarding responses to questions about the process of RhodeMap RI from the Rhode Island Division of Planning and the New Economic Development Element of the State Guide Plan will be forthcoming.

John Diet Deal suggested that additional information should be sought after, examined and explained to the public.

Motion by Mr. Primiano and seconded by Mrs. Strong to continue this agenda item to the next Town Council meeting which is scheduled on Monday, May 4, 2015. **The motion passed unanimously.**

UPDATE ON STREETLIGHTS:

Town Manager Peter DeAngelis stated that with recent legislation, the cities and towns have the ability to purchase streetlights. He said that the Energy Commission has been gathering information regarding the savings involved with the purchase of streetlights within the Town. He said that Executive Director of PRISM (Partnership for Rhode Island Streetlight Management) Jeff Broadhead has sent information regarding a program through its statewide buying power that enables each participating municipality to reduce street lighting expenses by 40 percent. Mr. DeAngelis explained that PRISM is a statewide nonprofit municipal collaboration to manage municipal streetlights, including ongoing maintenance, service changes, emergency repairs, LED upgrades, and controls installation after the legislature passed the Municipal Streetlights Investment Act in 2013. The Act offers municipalities a new way to save money on public streetlight maintenance and upgrades. Mr. DeAngelis stated that there are a few steps before the Town can proceed, but is still reviewing and analyzing the data. Mrs. Weymouth stated, "Doesn't it behoove us to support this legislation?" Mr. DeAngelis said that he has contacted our representatives and asked them to support legislation regarding the Municipal Streetlight Investment Act. Mrs. Weymouth requested that this topic of discussion continue on the next agenda of the Town Council.

DISCUSSION ON SOLAR PANELS AND PROPERTY TAXES:

Mr. Carroll stated that the Energy Commission has been working on two (2) aspects:

- (1) To evaluate our zoning, if it is sufficient to have solar panels on the roofs of homeowners and

(2) To evaluate the property tax provision making it invisible to the tax assessor Mr. Carroll stated that having solar panels is good for the environment and good for the grid but it should not be reflected in our property taxes. Mr. Carroll suggested that a new ordinance may need to be created pertaining to changes with zoning and/or taxes. Mr. Ursillo suggested that before an ordinance can be developed in the Town of Barrington, legislation may be needed within the Rhode Island General Assembly.
