2. Review of Status of the 2007 Legislative Package	Bob Cooper, Executive Secretary	15 min.

- (1) Change the Open Meeting Law's ban on the use of telephones allow the use of telephones as a reasonable accommodations for members of boards who are unable to be physically present at the meeting because of a disability [**sponsor Sen. Ciccone S 0142 Enacted into law**];
- (2) Amend the comprehensive instate services for individuals with traumatic brain injury legislation to authorize up to 10% of funding for DHS administrative expenses [**sponsors Sen. Blais S 0086 & Rep. McNamara H 5191**];
- (3) Create a loan repayment plan to keep newly trained community-based psychiatric and other therapeutic services providers in the state [**sponsors Rep. Ginaitt H 5313 & Sen. Sosnowski S 597**];
- (4) Require a percentage of each taxi fleet be accessible (modeled after the Louisville City Ordinance) [**sponsors Rep. Coderre H 5371 & Sen. Walaska S 553 Enacted into law**];
- (5) Extend governmental tort liability to members of state boards and commissions when acting in their official capacity and legal representation [**sponsors Rep. Mumford H 5290 & Sen. Lenihan S 330**]
- (6) Monitor implementation of legislation enacted in 2006 to:
 - (a.) Ensure families of children with severe impairments who have coverage from both Medicaid & commercial health care insurance, get quick resolution of their claims, rather than be bounced back and forth between Medicaid and the insurer (Public Law 2006 Chapter 246 Article 34 Insurance -- Mandated Benefits);
 - (b.) Senate Resolution 2006 Chapter 276 Urging The Department of Administration To Use Environmentally-Safe and Health-Friendly Cleaning Products In State Facilities and Workplaces, using the State House as a pilot project. Based on the results of the “pilot project”: in the future consider training for property managers, realtors, and health care practitioners specific to Multiple Chemical Sensitivity.
- (7) Advocate during the budget hearing for funding of:
 - (a.) Protective services for abused non-elderly adults (18-64) with severe impaired (Public Law 2006 Chapter 275) Assault on persons with severe impairments or mentally disabled - penalties - services for adult victims with severe impairments of abuse, neglect and/or exploitation
 - (b.) RIde & RIPTA funding as recommended by RIPEC in its Rhode Island at the Crossroads – A RIPEC Public Policy Issues Brief;
 - (c.) Modifications to homes/apartments owned or rented by families with disabled members (expand to include Medicare only recipients) and create flexible funding plan such as cash and counseling for families to modify home or yard;
 - (d.) Long term duration and on-going job coaches, in the MHRH Budget;
 - (e.) Medicaid funding for:
 - i. Expansion of Home Care Services so people can remain living in their community;
 - ii. Adjustment of state’s income eligibility level for Medicaid for persons with disabilities (100% of the federal poverty level) to match the Family Independence Program (185% of the federal poverty level) [**sponsor Sen. Ciccone S 0127**]
 - iii. Provide state funded health insurance coverage (including prescription drug coverage) during the 2-year wait for SSDI recipients to be covered by Medicare [by resolution or law];
 - iv. Amendment of the State Medicaid Plan so “medically needy” persons with disabilities, receive the same benefits that are provided to “categorically needy” persons (outpatient hospital clinic and emergency room services; hearing aids and molded shoes; Podiatry Services; one pair of

eyeglasses [frames, lenses, dispensing fees] every other year).

v. The habilitation waiver should be expanded to include all eligible recipients who would benefit from physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech/language therapy, psychological therapy, rehabilitation services;

vi. Develop a Dental Benefit Management program for Medicaid beneficiaries (reimbursement rate) [[Rep. Corvese H 5112](#)];

vii. Respite services for parents with a child with severe disabilities;

viii. Personal Care Assistance services for non-Medicaid population; and

(8) Monitor & support legislation to permit an accessory family dwelling within a single family residence for the sole use of one or more members of the family of the occupant who is a person with a disability or is over the age of sixty-five (65) [[sponsor Sen. Levesque S 0266](#)].

(9) School and Municipal Playground Safety grants [[sponsor Sen Blais S 0128](#)]

3. Recommendations for the 2008 Legislative Package

MOTION: To retain from 2007 Legislative Package the following:

1. Extend governmental tort liability to members of state boards and commissions when acting in their official capacity and legal representation;
2. Ensure families of children with severe impairments who have coverage from both Medicaid & commercial health care insurance, get quick resolution of their claims, rather than be bounced back and forth between Medicaid and the insurer (Public Law 2006 Chapter 246 Article 34 Insurance -- Mandated Benefits);
3. Crisis Intervention services for abused non-elderly adults (18-64) with severe impaired (Public Law 2006 Chapter 275) Assault on persons with severe impairments or mentally disabled - penalties - services for adult victims with severe impairments of abuse, neglect and/or exploitation;
4. Refocusing Medicaid from institutional care to home & community based services so people can remain living in their community; and
5. Permit an accessory family dwelling within a single family residence for the sole use of one or more members of the family of the occupant who is a person with a disability or is over the age of sixty-five (65);

SB/GR passed BI abstain

MOTION: Recommend to the Commission consider for discussion, and support the general principals accessible housing to require as part of the building code in residential ventilation and non-toxic building materials in defining “accessible, but not part of the Commission’s Legislative Package. BI/ JB passed, LG abstain.

6. Restoration of Department of Children, Youth, and Families services to children 18-21 and housing adolescents 17-21 at the youth correctional facility not in Adult Correctional Institution LD/LG passed, abstain JS

MOTION: Recommend the Commission send a letter requesting a Follow-up Report on the State House Toxic Free Cleaning Pilot Project (Senate Resolution 2006 Chapter
