President Roderick called for a Moment of Silence for the victims of the Boston Marathon bombing and the West, Texas explosion. Councilor Pelletier read a letter from the Town Council to Thomas Menino, Mayor of Boston and the Boston City Council.

Councilor Pelletier made a motion, seconded by Councilor deMedeiros to add the letter to the agenda. Motion passed unanimously.

Councilor deMedeiros made a motion, seconded by Councilor Gerlach to send the letter to the City of Boston. Motion passed unanimously.

President Roderick at this time in the meeting called for the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

**BUSINESS BROUGHT BEFORE THE COUNCIL**

**Receipt of Minutes from the following Boards, Commissions-Wastewater Management Commission**

Councilor Gerlach read the minutes with interest, request having them come in to update the Council. Town Administrator Goncalo explained they would be here on May 28<sup>th</sup> to update.

Councilor Gerlach made a motion, seconded by Councilor Chabot to accept the March 18, 2013 minutes from the Wastewater Management Commission. Motion passed unanimously.

**CRMC Public Notices received on applications of Mark Lescault, Laura Lane and Scott W. Pray, Trustees on 293 Nanaquaket Road – Posted at Town Hall**

Councilor Lambert noted the Public Notice relative to 293 Nanaquaket Road to remove an existing float and ramp and replace with piles at a residential boating facility. The second Public Notice is for the same address regarding a boat lift. No problem with receiving and filing but suggests the notices should refer to the Harbor Commission. Town Clerk Nancy Mello explained the Harbor Commission also receives copies, are routinely scanned and emailed to the Harbor Commission Chair, Bruce Cox. This notice was sent to the Council, was posted here at the Town Hall. Councilor Lambert did call Mr. Cox, would like some background or a recommendation from the Harbor Commission. Town Clerk Mello noted it was in the Harbor Commission mailbox, probably has not been picked up yet.

Councilor Lambert made a motion, seconded by Councilor Chabot to accept the receipt of CA3a, CRMC Public Notice received relative to a dock proposal at 293 Nanaquaket Road. Motion passed unanimously.

**OPEN PUBLIC FORUM**

Barbara Pelletier last week attended a lengthy meeting of the Tourism Council, looking for a wish list, ideas. Tourism is the third largest industry in Rhode Island, looking to see what Tiverton can do to utilize, great need for hotel space. Roger Bennis discussed two items, one the Route 24 Sakonnet Bridge entrance from Main Road, should refer to Chief Blakey to prevent accidents because of the slope of the guard rail, the angle of approach, inadequate distance to provide a safe merge and the stop sign at the entrance to the expressway. The second item, the Sakonnet Bridge tolls, will be a hearing at the State House on Thursday, April 25<sup>th</sup> at 1:00 pm which is a chance to speak directly to the legislators. A bus will leave from the park and ride at 11:30 am, \$19 million dollars will be used to fund all other bridges, urge people to attend. Town Clerk Mello noted, a notice was posted here and forwarded to the Council. T/A Goncalo did receive an email from the DOT regarding the bridge.

Police Chief Thomas Blakey thanked Barbara Pelletier for the Police Honor Guard flag and plaque. Chief Blakey displayed the flag so all could see the work done by Mrs. Pelletier.

**PUBLIC HEARINGS & PUBLIC PRESENTATIONS:**

**PUBLIC PRESENTATIONS**

**Brian Ackley, Innovative Storage & Filing, Providence, Rhode Island – Brief Presentation on Shelving For Vault in Clerk’s Office**

Brian Ackley from Innovative Storage & Filing explained the proposed shelving for the vault in the Clerk's office. Work with a number of cities and towns, looked at the vault for more storage in the limited space, has no more space for land evidence expansion, the older books when preserved contain plastic sleeves. Suggest putting in movable shelving to double the capacity, will be on flat rollers, will increase 60% to land evidence storage without adding additional square footage. Town Clerk Mello explained, trying to preserve old books, is also later in the agenda, have three vendor bids, funded by the historical records and tech account. Mr. Ackley added, this system can be expanded in the future.

**Public Hearing – Proposed Amendments to Code of Ordinances Chapter 15 – Drinking Water Reservoirs (Sections 15-1 Through 15-5)**

**a.Resolution by North Tiverton Fire District Supporting Any and All Measurers to Restrict motorized Recreational Activity on Stafford Pond**

**b.Letter Sent to Legislators for Assistance in Obtaining a Meeting With DEM Director Coit**

President Roderick opened the Public Hearing on the Proposed Amendment to the Code of Ordinances Chapter 15-Drinking Water Reservoirs, requested anyone from the public to come forward if wishing to speak. Jim Charette, lived there 23 years was concerned about riparian rights, not thrilled about the fishing tournaments. Tom Ramotowski, Conservation Commission Chair, speaking as a citizen, not opposed to the ordinance, have to look at in context where these tournaments are occurring. This is the only drinking water that has a documented public access boat ramp; the ordinance is designed to address. The neighbors are under strict rules to improve water quality, can fish at other ponds, should not be doing on a water supply. Don't have another water source, trying to regulate to some extent, request consideration to approve. Joe Souza understood the sensitivity, did not want to lose the little bit of tourism, suggest only electric motor boats. Joe Medeiros suggested discontinuing all tournaments. Roger Bennis suggested increasing the amount of the liability insurance to \$10 or 20 million; limit the horsepower of the boats.

Solicitor Teitz explained the point was not to eliminate the fishing tournaments, requested information from the DEM, was not provided, this is for regulatory informational gathering, have put in reasonable requirements, charging the Conservation Commission with research and to report back to the Council by next fall. This proposed ordinance does not specifically affect riparian rights. Councilor Lambert was concerned; acting out of order, suggest first asking for a meeting with DEM, asks Senator Felag to facilitate a meeting with DEM Director Coit for further discussion. Would like to do first requesting they try to work with the Town; do not want to be in a situation to have to back out of the ordinance.

President Roderick requested input from Senator Wally Felag who was in attendance. Senator Felag recalled the February 28<sup>th</sup> meeting of a group from Tiverton and DEM to formulate rules and regulations. Surprised to see the proposed ordinance. Was waiting to see what direction the Town was going in. Solicitor Teitz noted DEM did not contact the Town after the initial meeting, received a letter from DEM threatening litigation and a list of 19 tournaments. Senator Felag was hearing this for the first time. President Roderick agreed with Councilor Lambert, need to speak with DEM, requested Senator Felag to intervene to speak with Director Coit to have a meeting as soon as possible noting the water importance. Councilor Gerlach suggested continuing the public hearing until the May 28 Council meeting. Solicitor Teitz explained the DEM had conflicting regulations done and has not been enforcing for fishing tournaments. Renee Jones questioned Federal guidelines, may have some say in the matter. Solicitor Teitz explained the EPA does control certain aspects. Brian O'Neill pointed out there is no permit process for a tournament, can call DEM and get one in five days, has been no enforcement. Councilor Gerlach thanked everyone who participated, strong show of support, talking about providing long term water quality of Stafford Pond as a drinking water source. Important all are aware trying to get regulations has been a dip in water quality over the last several years, support continuing the public hearing. Thanked Senator Felag for his support.

Councilor Gerlach made a motion, seconded by Councilor Arruda to continue the Public Hearing on the Proposed Amendments to Code of Ordinances Chapter 15- Drinking Water Reservoirs (Sections 15-1 Through 15-5) to Tuesday, May 28 2013. Motion passed unanimously.

**Public Hearing–Proposed Amendment to Code of Ordinances Chapter 78–Traffic and Vehicles Section 71**

President Roderick opened the Public Hearing on the Proposed Amendments to the Code of Ordinances Chapter 78- Traffic and Vehicles Section 78-71. Solicitor Teitz explained one of the changes was for Canonicus Street, Main Road to Senior Center, had been Barker School. Another change was for Evans Avenue, changed to reflect the Sakonnet Bridge Route 24 change and for public safety added a section for Old Stafford Road. Chief Blakey had surveyed the area did support the ordinance. Councilor Pelletier questioned Chief Blakey if there was a conflict with the Evans Avenue change on the first page. Solicitor Teitz explained this was only a slightly smaller area, was comfortable with Central Avenue. President Roderick called for comments from the public for the third time. President Roderick closed the public hearing for the amendments to Code of Ordinances Chapter 78- Traffic and Vehicles Section 78-71.

Councilor Pelletier made a motion, seconded by Councilor Arruda to approve the Proposed Amendments to Code of Ordinances Chapter 78 – Traffic and Vehicles Section 78-71 as set forth in agenda item B2. Motion passed unanimously.

Town Clerk Mello explained this was a renewal, Mr. Arteaga was aware of the Council meeting date.

Councilor Pelletier made a motion, seconded by Councilor deMedeiros to approve the Renewal of Peddler’s License to Alejandro Arteaga d/b/a Palagis Ice Cream Co., 237 Suffolk Ave., Pawtucket, subject to meeting all legal requirements. Motion passed unanimously.

Councilor Chabot made a motion, seconded by Councilor Pelletier to reappoint Carolyn M. Hall, 15 Mockingbird Lane to the Art’s Committee. Motion passed on a vote of 6-0-1, Councilor deMedeiros abstained, not at Council table.

**Street Advisory Committee – 2 Year Term Expiring April 15, 2014-Audrey Gloddy, 195 Crandall Road**

Councilor deMedeiros returned to the Council table at this time. Ms. Gloddy explained, has been a resident for 36 years, has done a lot of research on street, residents need representation. Councilor Pelletier asked why did Ms. Gloddy want to be on this board and if she had read the Charter. Ms. Gloddy had attended several Street Committee meetings; extensive research needs to be done.

Councilor Pelletier made a motion, seconded by Councilor deMedeiros to appoint Audrey Gloddy, 195 Crandall Road to the Street Advisory Committee for a two year term expiring April 15, 2014. Motion passed unanimously.

**Recreation Commission – 3 Year Terms Expiring April 15, 2016 -Gary P. Rose, 34 Chace Avenue**

Councilor Gerlach made a motion, seconded by Councilor deMedeiros to reappoint Gary P. Rose, 34 Chace Avenue, to the Recreation Commission to a three year term expiring April 15, 2016. Motion passed unanimously.

President Roderick noted Mr. Almeida served on the Personnel Board for over ten years should send thanks for service with deep regret.

Councilor Arruda made a motion, seconded by Councilor Pelletier to send thanks for serving for ten years and to accept the resignation with deep regret. Motion passed unanimously.

**NEW BUSINESS:**

**Town Administrator – Ratification of Senior Center Director 3-Year Contract – July 1, 2012 Through June 30, 2015 – Janice Gomes – Noticed per Charter**

Administrator Goncalo requested ratification of the 3 year contract for the Senior Center Director, used the recently adopted Model Contract. Ms. Gomes questioned the T/A if the contract was retroactive back to 2012. T/A Goncalo indicated it was retroactive back to July 1, 2012, due for review by July 1, 2013. All salary increases have been lumped into the Future Needs account. President Roderick explained the Future Needs account was set up to hold the funds for salary increases because the budget cycle does not follow all the contracts. T/A Goncalo requested one change to this contract on page 2. Ms. Gomes is not paid in arrears, paid up to the date of employment, request striking out in arrears.

Councilor Pelletier made a motion, seconded by Councilor deMedeiros to ratify the Senior Center Director Contract three year contract for Janice Gomes from July 1 ,2012 to June 30,2015 with the notated change to page 2. Motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Gomes thanked the Council.

**Town Administrator – Ratification of Police Chief 3-Year Contract – Sept. 8, 2012 Through September 7, 2015 – Thomas Blakey – Noticed per Charter**

Administrator Goncalo explained the Police Chief's contract was the same situation, this contract retroactive to September 8, 2012, also follows the Model Contract. Councilor Chabot noted this contract would supersede any previous agreements since current contract still in effect.

Councilor Pelletier made a motion, seconded by Councilor deMedeiros to ratify Police Chief three-year contract for Thomas Blakey dated September 8, 2012 through September 7, 2015. Motion passed unanimously.

Chief Blakey thanked the Council.

**Town Administrator – Ratification of Tax Assessor 3 – Year Contract – December 11, 2012 Through December 10, 2015 – David Robert – Noticed per Charter**

Administrator Goncalo requested ratification of Tax Assessor Dave Robert's contract retroactive to December 11, 2012. Councilor Pelletier noticed a typo on page 2, the salary should be \$65,405 not \$65.405. Mr. Robert questioned the average hours per week expected to be 37.5, currently listed as 32.5 same as the staff but usually work more than that, understand the issue, do work the extra hours. President Roderick appreciated the time the Assessor puts in on the job.

Councilor Pelletier made a motion to ratify the Tax Assessor 3 Year Contract, December 11, 2012 through December 10, 2015 for David Robert. Motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Robert thanked the Council.

**Town Clerk – Request to Waive Bid Process for Vault Shelving and Award To Innovative Storage & Filing, Providence, Rhode Island – Three Proposals**

Town Clerk Mello referred to the earlier presentation, also had 2 different bids to compare and had a third company come with recommendation, recommend staying with Innovative Storage and waive the bidding process, funding all set, some other works needs to be done to have the shelves installed by Town Maintenance Director.

Councilor Gerlach made a motion, seconded by Councilor Chabot to Waive Bid Process for Vault Shelving and Award to Innovative Storage & Filing, Providence, Rhode Island for \$12,800.64. Motion passed unanimously.

**Update on Pocasset School Drainage Issue**

T/A Goncalo explained all the test pits were dug, did not find ledge or rock, can tell the contractor to go forward. Should start in about a week. Councilor Arruda added will also notify the Recreation Board and will have a safety fence. President Roderick noted this had already been authorized.

**Update on Request For Approval to Modify Rules and Regulations at Town Farm to Allow Pets on Walking Track**

T/A Goncalo explained, had pulled off a previous agenda, Recreation Commission had voted not to allow dogs. Councilor Arruda requested the Council discuss this with the recommendation from Recreation.

Councilor Arruda made a motion, seconded by Councilor deMedeiros to possibly amend and discuss the Town Ordinance to allow dogs at Town Farm to modify the rules and regulations on the next agenda. The motion was clarified this would be for discussion only to go forward to schedule a public hearing. Councilor Arruda amended the motion, seconded by Councilor deMedeiros, passed unanimously. Solicitor Teitz clarified would just be on the agenda for discussion.

President Roderick requested Chee Laureanno to provide an update on tolls on the Sakonnet Bridge. Ms. Laureanno explained Tiverton STOP thanked the Tiverton School Committee for the recent resolution and Linda Larsen, Tiverton First for their support by sending out flyers to their members urging them to attend the upcoming public hearing. It will be one of the most important meetings as the tolls will be devastating. Need to get people there. Thanked Solicitor Teitz for doing an excellent memorandum especially pages 5 and 6, the Administrative Procedures Act. The Portsmouth Town Council will be considering Federal action. Sally Black, School Committee Chair, urged everyone to attend.

Councilor Pelletier noted the need for judges for the senior projects at the High School on May 29<sup>th</sup> from noon to 2:00 p.m. Registration starts at 9:30 a.m. Call Peter Forest at 624-8494 ext. 231 if interested in judging.

Councilor Gerlach received interest from Garry Plunkett to coordinate and update the Council; Apex Wind will be in Town May 13<sup>th</sup>.

**ORDINANCE NO. 2013-**

**AN ORDINANCE IN AMENDMENT TO  
CHAPTER 78 – TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES  
OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE TOWN OF TIVERTON**

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED by the Town Council of Tiverton, Rhode Island, that Chapter 78 - Traffic and Vehicles, Article III - Stopping, Standing And Parking, Division 1 – Generally, of the Ordinances of the Town of Tiverton be amended as follows, with new text underlined:

**Sec. 78-71. - Parking prohibited—At all times on certain streets.**

No person shall park a vehicle at any time upon any of the following streets or portions of such streets:

Street	Side	Location
Campion Avenue	Both	For 50 feet southerly from Bulgarmarsh Road.
Canonicus Street	Both	For 25 feet easterly of Main Road.
Canonicus Street	South	Main Road to <b>Senior Center</b> .
Crandall Road	East	From Pershing Avenue north to Cala Avenue.
Evans Avenue	South	From Main Road west to <b>Central Avenue</b> .
Hillside Avenue	West	Entire length.
Hilton Street	Both	From Main Road running in a westerly direction for 75 feet.
