RI Department of Health, Division of Community, Family Health and Equity administers RI's Title V Program. It strives to preserve, protect and promote the health and development of all women of maternal age, children and families with a goal of reducing and preventing diseases and disabilities. The Division develops and supports community-based programs and systems of care that address the health and development needs for all children and their families, evaluates the health and development of children with a focus on policy development and planning, and invests in information, education, public engagement, and community partnership development with a focus on prevention. The Division involved parents in all aspects of Community, Family Health and Equity activities. The Division is home to several major public health programs and services for children and families, including Home Visiting, WIC, Immunization, Healthy Homes and Environment, Chronic Disease Prevention, Newborn Screening, Special Health Care Needs and Family Planning.






